PAs are currently not regulated in Ontario, but function safely & efficiently under medical directives and delegated acts.

PAs are employed across Canada in a wide variety of settings, including primary care, emergency medicine, internal medicine, cardiology, dermatology, orthopedics and many others.

McMaster University's Bachelor of Health Sciences, Physician Assistant degree (BHScPA), is a two-year health professional degree program housed in the Michael G. DeGroote School of Medicine.

Program Goals & Overview

The goal of the PA program is to graduate physician assistants who are ready to enter the healthcare workforce as adaptable, knowledgeable and competent health practitioners dedicated to life-long learning.

Year 1: Students are on campus participating in problem based learning tutorials, medical simulations, large group sessions, professional competency curriculum, communications and clinical skills.

Year 2: Students are across Ontario completing core and elective clinical clerkship rotations.

Student & Preceptor Expectations

Supervisory Role

A clinical preceptor is expected to be a licensed physician and/or certified physician assistant who provides daily supervision and teaching to the PA learner. PA clerks should be held to the same standard as final year medical students, with identical expectations. Delegating tasks to the PA clerk will depend on your comfort, PA clerk level of knowledge, and your working relationship.

Student Evaluation

Preceptors complete a mid-unit and final evaluation, in addition to daily feedback. Formal evaluations are required by the program to issue preceptor payment. Final assessments are generated through our E*Value evaluation system, and sent to you via an email notification.

Function of PA Clerk

PA clerks may be assigned a comprehensive list of responsibilities, including conducting patient histories, interviews, physical exams, diagnosing and treating, counseling and assisting with procedures.

What can PA students contribute to a clinic?

- Preceptors may see more patients during the day with the help of a PA clerk
- Preceptors may do paperwork or return phone calls while the PA clerk interviews the patient
- Patients may enjoy shorter wait times, longer amounts of time with a provider, and generally feel more satisfied with their visit
